A. COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course engages the Post Vatican II directives and renewed vision of the laity and implications for the mission of the Church in the modern world. It examines the history of ministry, and explores the theology, function, and fundamental principles of ministry. Current issues and challenges will be identified and critiqued in light of their pastoral implications.

B. GOALS

This course will assist students to grow in the following knowledge, skills and attitudes:

Knowledge:

- 1. understand the nature of lay ministry as set forth in Church documents
- 2. examine the history of lay ministry in the Church bringing us to the current day
- 3. identify the role to which the baptized are called
- 4. discuss the various methods of lay ministry as lived out today
- 5. uncover ethical issues in ministry

Skills:

- 1. develop and articulate their own personal vision for ministry
- 2. identify current issues and challenges in ministry
- 3. exercise conversation and dialogue skills
- 4. analyze Church documents
- 5. develop approaches for dealing with controversy
- 6. identify and exercise professional responsibility in ministry
- 7. reflect on the minister's relationship to the Church
- 8. review various methods for growing in holiness
- 9. demonstrate fluency in spoken and written English

Attitudes:

- 1. celebrate the richness of our Baptismal call
- 2. appreciate the history of lay involvement in the Church
- 3. appreciate the exploration of various approaches to lay ministry as lived out today in the Church and in the World
- 4. develop an openness to new ideas, respect for others, and hospitality
- 5. appreciate how Canon Law is an instrument of the pastoral mission of the Church and how it can serve one's own pastoral ministry
- 6. reflect on one's own perceptions about growth in spiritual life
